
Eco Fair

FIRST READING Exodus 16:2-4. 9-15

A reading from the book of Exodus.

The whole congregation of the Israelites complained against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness. The Israelites said to them, "If only we had died by the hand of the LORD in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the fleshpots and ate our fill of bread; for you have brought us out into this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger." Then the LORD said to Moses, "I am going to rain bread from heaven for you, and each day the people shall go out and gather enough for that day. In that way I will test them, whether they will follow my instruction or not." Then Moses said to Aaron, "Say to the whole congregation of the Israelites, 'Draw near to the LORD, for he has heard your complaining." And as Aaron spoke to the whole congregation of the Israelites, they looked toward the wilderness, and the glory of the LORD appeared in the cloud. The LORD spoke to Moses and said, "I have heard the complaining of the Israelites; say to them, 'At twilight you shall eat meat, and in the morning you shall have your fill of bread; then you shall know that I am the LORD your God." In the evening quails came up and covered the camp; and in the morning there was a layer of dew around the camp. When the layer of dew lifted, there on the surface of the wilderness was a fine flaky substance, as fine as frost on the ground. When the Israelites saw it, they said to one another, "What is it?" For they did not know what it was. Moses said to them, "It is the bread that the LORD has given you to eat."

SECOND READING Ephesians 4:1-16

A reading from the letter of Paul to the Ephesians.

I, the prisoner in the Lord, beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all. But each of us was given grace according to the measure of Christ's gift. Therefore it is said, "When he ascended on high he made captivity itself a captive; he gave gifts to his people." (When it says, "He ascended," what does it mean but that he had also descended into the lower parts of the earth? He who descended is the same one who ascended far above all the heavens, so that he might fill all things.) The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ. We must no longer be children, tossed to and fro and blown about by every wind of doctrine, by people's trickery, by their craftiness in deceitful scheming. But speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and knit together by every ligament with which it is equipped, as each part is working properly, promotes

the body's growth in building itself up

GOSPEL John 6:24-35

Hear the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

When the crowd saw that neither Jesus nor his disciples were at the place where Jesus had given the bread, they themselves got into the boats and went to Capernaum looking for Jesus. When they found him on the other side of the lake, they said to him, "Rabbi, when did you come here?" Jesus answered them, "Very truly, I tell you, you are looking for me, not because you saw signs, but because you ate your fill of the loaves. Do not work for the food that perishes, but for the food that endures for eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you. For it is on him that God the Father has set his seal." Then they said to him, "What must we do to perform the works of God?" Jesus answered them, "This is the work of God, that you believe in him whom he has sent." So they said to him, "What sign are you going to give us then, so that we may see it and believe you? What work are you performing? Our ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness; as it is written, 'He gave them bread from heaven to eat." Then Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, it was not Moses who gave you the bread from heaven, but it is my Father who gives you the true bread from heaven. For the bread of God is that which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world." They said to him, "Sir, give us this bread always." Jesus said to them, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty."

For years Maura had been trying to educate her children in the skills of housekeeping such as cleaning, shopping, washing, ironing and cooking. One of the boys, Michael, who could turn his hand to most tasks, placed housekeeping low on his list of priorities. No amount of persuasion from Maura could convince him of the usefulness of such skills when he left home. But he had more interesting things to do. He did the minimum demanded of him and then disappeared.

Going away to college gave him a different perspective. He shared a house with other students and found it difficult to live in a messy and disorganised environment. He was obliged to use instant foods while wishing that he could cook more substantial meals. Admitting this to Maura was uncomfortable, but subsequent visits home taught him what he needed to know in order to grow more self-sufficient and to enjoy using his skills.

Maura was delighted at the transformation. Michael had discovered through experience a new vision, one of what life could be like by using his strength of character to admit his needs and with the motivation of a messy house. Thanks to Maura's willingness to teach him, Michael grew up into a greater maturity. His boundaries extended, his horizons became more exciting and the quality of his life changed for the better and for ever.

Gospel Teaching

The crowds who came searching for Jesus in today's Gospel reading brought with them a confused set of questions and desires. They wanted to find out more about God; they wanted to see signs of God's presence among them; they wanted help in understanding the relationship between Jesus' teaching and the teaching they had grown up with.

Jesus was surprisingly gentle with them. He knew he was making headway in his ministry when the people began asking him questions about their lives and how the way they lived related to his teaching. They had discovered their need for a teacher.

The sick, always in need of healing, began to realise that this man Jesus might be a source of their desire. Sinners had come to see him as one with spiritual authority who could see into hearts, could understand the motivations and circumstances of their lives, one who might grant them God's forgiveness. Lonely people, outcasts from the Temple or society, saw in him a friend who would not let them down, one who, in bringing them together with one another, would also share their exile.

Jesus came to his followers according to their need. Jesus knew them well and recognised their motives but did not judge them accordingly. Instead he offered them a new vision of life and its expectations, a new vision of God. They had originally followed him because they were physically hungry. Now they were ready for something beyond the physical. He offered himself as their salvation, which he spoke of in terms they would understand. Their new hunger could only be met by a new bread. Jesus would be this bread. With him as their bread, he would not only satisfy their temporary needs but would fill them with a new life.

When the people recognised their needs, Jesus was ready to satisfy them and bring them into a deeper relationship with God through himself.

Application

We too must try to understand where our own lives are impoverished: to look at ourselves honestly in order to discover our weaknesses and strengths so that we know what to pray for in order to become more perfect before God.

We are already strengthened and blessed by our baptism, so we are partly prepared. We may have gifts which are underused; ideals as yet unfulfilled; longings for life to be different, a desire to change ourselves and the world more in keeping with God's will.

When we experience these feelings we are beginning to grow in maturity. We see that we can change and we reach for a greater wholeness in our lives. This is the moment for us to ask: "Jesus, what must we do, to be doing the works of God?" Being aware that we need to be told will open our eyes and ears and hearts to the answers. But an earnest desire to grow and to change for God's purposes will give us a clearer vision of Christ and his teaching. He will feed us with the manna from heaven that we need.

REFLECTION

aith, they say, can move mountains. This week's readings end with the Bible verse that gave rise to that expression, although anyone who's holidayed in Switzerland, for example, might wonder what Jesus could mean.



As well as mountains we read a lot about faith this week. Our Old Testament readings remind us how the people miraculously freed from slavery in Egypt still lacked faith in what God could do for them.

In the Gospel reading for Wednesday Jesus praised the Canaanite woman's faith for believing in what he could do, and persisting in that. This week we see Peter's faith, and lack of it. He even walked on water when Jesus called him, before momentarily losing faith when the wind got up. He recognised Jesus as the Messiah (Thursday) but then earned another rebuke for refusing to accept what that really meant.

Celebrating the Transfiguration on Friday, we recall how Jesus was revealed as God's beloved Son, on what Peter later called a "holy mountain". Peter eventually understood. Faith isn't always easy. Neither is climbing a mountain. But if we start with that tiny amount Jesus mentions, we don't need to climb - we can move the mountains of doubt from our path.

PRAYER

Creator God, you gave us the grandeur and beauty of the mountains. Strengthen our faith in your amazing love for each one of us, that, when life's problems look like mountains we could never climb, our trust in you will make them scaleable.



THE EUCHARIST

PART III – REFORMATION TO THE BOOK OF COMMON PRAYER

The sixteenth-century Reformation theologians were unanimous in regarding the congregation's exclusion from almost every aspect of the Eucharist as untenable. Communion should take place only if people and clergy both received bread and wine. However, the nature of Christ's presence in the Eucharist provoked profound debate and disagreement. Martin Luther rejected the traditional doctrine that at consecration bread and wine became Christ's body and blood, yet he maintained that while the elements remained of bread and wine Christ was nevertheless present in them. Others, such as Ulrich Zwingli, went further: bread and wine were purely symbols of Christ's body and blood, Communion simply evoking remembrance of the Lord's sacrifice and thus was only a means to devotion, not an agency of grace. The paradox was that while the reformers reclaimed the Eucharist for everyone, translating its key texts into the vernacular, by downgrading its importance they dramatically reduced the frequency with which it was celebrated.

European Reformation theology influenced Thomas Cranmer's transformation of the Church of England. By 1549 English was used throughout a new Eucharistic liturgy and all references to the Mass as sacrifice were removed. More radical change was introduced in the 1552 Prayer Book that rejected Cranmer's emphasis on Christ being present when bread and wine were faithfully received by each congregant. The liturgy now explicitly declared that the elements were simply eaten in grateful remembrance of Christ's passion. Vestments were reduced to plain surplice over cassock, clergy instructed to preside from the north side of a wooden table adorned only with linen and positioned in the chancel on an east–west axis. Penitence rather than celebration became the overriding tone.

The 1559 revision softened some instructions regarding vestments and the position of the Communion table, while further minor changes were introduced when the Book of Common Prayer was approved in 1662. But, textually, Anglican liturgy from 1559 to the middle of the twentieth century was remarkably consistent with Cranmer's original reforms, providing a comforting spiritual rhythm across personal and national life.

Food for the journey

magine it. You and your family have fled from an oppressive regime. With many others you have followed a charismatic leader across borders. You have dramatically escaped murderous pursuers. Now you are safe.

But you are in a wilderness. There are a lot of you, and there is no obvious food. Going back means slavery at best, death at worst. Going on means thirst and starvation. You turn on your leaders. What were they thinking, bringing you out here? What is the point of freedom if you are going to starve?

It could be the story of twentyfirst-century refugees. But it is also the story of the Israelites. And God has things covered. It is not for the sake of their own freedom that they have been rescued from Egypt; it is because they are destined for a role as God's people, God's representatives in the world. They have a lot to learn, and one of the first things is trust. It will take forty years to learn, and this is the first lesson. In the evening God sends meat in the form of birds. And after the morning dew there is something else, something they have never seen before, something they call "whatsit", "manna".

In our developed world we mostly take our food for granted. But on Sundays we gather to remember our dependence on God, and to eat our manna, the bread of heaven that binds us together in Christ as God's saved people.

Give us today, Lord, our daily bread, that we may be sustained on our journey. Keep us always mindful of our dependence on you, and feed us with the bread of life, that we may look forward with joy to our final feast at your table. Amen.

The Sheldon community in a time of pandemic

The books of the Old **Testament** "In the beginning" - the book of Genesis

Genesis is the first chapter in a grand story that takes us from a garden of delight to a glorious city. It sets the stage, as God makes the world and its creatures, despairs of human beings, but allows them to play a role in the plan of salvation.

There is drama, when it seems Abraham will never have the descendants God has promised. There is humour, when his grandson Jacob wakes up after his wedding to find he has married the wrong sister (chapter 29). There is horror, when Isaac lies on a sacrificial pyre, his father's knife descending on him (22). There is pathos, when Joseph and his brothers are reunited (45). There is mystery, when God and Jacob wrestle in the night (32).

Ancient tradition suggests that the first five books of the Bible, the Torah to Jews, the Pentateuch to scholars, were written by Moses. Yet many inconsistencies are evidence of more than one author. Scholars have long believed that these books grew up over centuries, with stories from different sources collected to make a rich tapestry. The final editor is probably responsible for prefacing the whole with Genesis 1, a statement of the supremacy of God, who brings order out of chaos.



Jesus tells the people that he is the bread of life and if we believe in him we can live forever and be happy with him.


