

Say no to the mow. Mowing your lawn less and letting parts grow long saves you time and helps give nature a home. If you want to make an even bigger impact on wildlife, wait to mow your lawn or a section of it until August to support even more animals. March for Nature, London, Saturday 22nd June - join me for a church service.

This march, supported by groups including The Wildlife Trusts, The RSPB, The Climate Coalition, Chris Packham, WWF-UK, National Trust, WWT, Woodland Trust and Rewilding Britain, is aiming to be a really big gathering. It takes place in London and is a family-friendly, legal march to demand that UK politicians show strong domestic and global nature and climate leadership. There will be a strong Christian presence, including A Rocha UK, Christian Climate Action, Green Christian, Operation Noah and other groups, and these are organising a service at 11am at Catholic Church of the Immaculate Conception, 114 Mount St, Mayfair, London, W1K 3AH, which includes a children's outdoor nature-based church. THE POWER OF POETRY: MAY

This month: a poem by D H Lawrence, mainly known of course for his novels and which you may know at least by reputation. He was known too for travel writing, essays, letters and plays. He was also a prolific poet, though many of the thousand poems he wrote were not regarded highly, and the selection I have in front of me numbers just 150. A few are quite well known, e.g. Snake ("A snake came to my water trough..."), and I came across The North Country many years ago and was struck by the rhythm of the poetry which – particularly if read aloud and with due regard to the punctuation - reflects the insistent rhythm of machinery and industry. This poem is Pax (peace). It describes a comfortable cat relaxing before a fire, and Lawrence's description is a metaphor for contemplation and for being fully in the presence of God. For some, such an experience can be fearful, but here, with the image of the relaxed cat luxuriating in the warmth, we are encouraged to be at one with God, and at home in His presence. You will notice Lawrence's use of repetition throughout.



All that matters is to be at one with the living God to be a creature in the house of the God of Life. Like a cat asleep on a chair at peace, in peace and at one with the master of the house, with the mistress, at home, at home in the house of the living, sleeping on the hearth and yawning before the fire.

Sleeping on the hearth of the living world yawning at home before the fire of life feeling the presence of the living God like a great reassurance, a deep calm in the heart, a presence as of the master sitting at the board in his own and greater being, in the house of life.

The idea of reassurance, which we so often need in our lives, and of calm is very comforting, as indeed are many of the words selected by Lawrence - asleep, peace, at one, and so on. As far as the cat is concerned though, I suspect any contemplation would be of mice!
