Brathwaite Memorial Lecture and Update on our Plans

Last Sunday, it was a joy to welcome Revd Dr Duncan Dormer, General Secretary of USPG, to give our third annual lecture connected to the contested heritage at St Martin's. I know that many of you enjoyed meeting him and talking with him before and after our 10 am Communion Service, and those who were able to attend the lecture in person praised the content and presentation of his talk on: USPG's **Renewal and Reconciliation: The Codrington Reparations Project.**

Our aim had been to live-stream the lecture, but unfortunately there were technical difficulties which meant that only the last 10 minutes of the talk, plus the Q&A section, were uploaded to our YouTube channel. Duncan has very kindly agreed to provide us with the transcript of his talk so that those who weren't able to attend it will be able to read it.

If you weren't at our 10 am service or watching it online, I would recommend you look at the Notices section of the YouTube video of the service, starting from 1.15.20 where Duncan introduces USPG and the Project. He also praised St Martin's for establishing the lecture series, saying that, as a church, we are 'leading a set of important conversations'. I am also pleased to give below details of the update report regarding our Contested Heritage which I presented to the PCC meeting on 12 June: "On 2 May 2024 members of the DAC (Diocesan Advisory Committee), including stonemason Chris Anstey, as well as Archdeacon Martin Breadmore and Revd Folli Olokose, visited St Martin's to look at the Brathwaite Memorial in situ. They recommended that, instead of trying to fit a new stone memorial into the narrow space available, the most appropriate memorial to commemorate the enslaved would be a work of art created by an artist from the Barbadian community, and its location need not be restricted next to the memorial but could be placed wherever it is most appropriate. We are really encouraged to receive this positive recommendation from the DAC, as it gives us the opportunity to work together to create something that will truly represent the enslaved and bring them imaginatively into the sacred space of our church where previously their voice has not been heard. The DAC also recommended that our proposed information panel (including the QR code) be in the form of a permanent fixture in the church near to the memorial.

Looking further ahead, St Martin's will hold a Memorial Service to commemorate the lives of those who were enslaved on the plantations associated with John Brathwaite. This will be in conjunction with Peter Brathwaite and the wider Brathwaite family. The service will take place at 7.30 pm on Tuesday 25 March, the United Nations' International Day of Remembrance of the Victims of Slavery and the Transatlantic Slave Trade. Bishop Paul has confirmed his support and participation in this service. This, together with our work on the new memorial, is part of St Martin's outreach with the wider community, especially those who are personally impacted by the injustice of past enslavement.' Ukrainian Refugees still urgently need accommodation

Many people in Epsom, including members of St Martin's, came forward and offered space in their homes to those fleeing the war in Ukraine. As the war continues, there is still an urgent need for more people to provide a safe home for those who have nowhere to live, not just for new arrivals but also for those needing to move on from their initial host family due to changes in circumstances. Ride and Stride Day

THE POWER OF POETRY: JULY by Mary Gilbert

This month, Rudyard Kipling: It is well-nigh impossible to do justice to Kipling's life in the space available. Born in India in 1865, sent home, aged 5, with his younger sister, to board with strangers in Southsea. His parents stayed in India (a period remembered in later years with hatred). Then school at Westward Ho!, back to Lahore as a reporter, published *Departmental Ditties* in 1886, back to London and literary success in 1889, marriage 1892, death of elder daughter 1899, Nobel prize 1907, death (missing in action) of his son in 1915, and Kipling's own death in 1936.

He published much, including *The Jungle Books, Kim,* and *Just So Stories,* and lots of poetry. Two of his aunts were married to Sir Edward Burne-Jones and Sir Edward Poynter, and Stanley Baldwin was a cousin. He is often accused of being an imperialist, but there is no doubt that he loved India, was inspired by it, and wrote about it often, though never returning after leaving in 1886. He wrote an affecting war poem, *My Boy Jack,* which contrary to what I expected when I read it first, was not about his own son but about Jack Cornwell, the youngest sailor to perish at the battle of Jutland.

I've chosen *The Way Through the Woods,* a celebration of the triumph of nature over the man-made. It is a haunting evocation of the quiet of the woods - you can almost smell the damp earth, feel the cool air and hear the rustle of the wood's inhabitants. Perhaps the woods represent the difficulties of a journey through life, but the main theme of the poem seems to be that ultimately our stay on earth is transitory and that given a chance nature *will* triumph. I find a sort of comfort in that concept.

They shut the road through the woods Seventy years ago. Weather and rain have undone it again, And now you would never know There was once a road through the woods Before they planted the trees. It is underneath the coppice and heath, And the coppice and heath, And the thin anemones. Only the keeper sees That, where the ring-dove broods, And the badgers roll at ease, There was once a road through the woods.

Yet if you enter the woods Of a summer evening late, When the night-air cools on the trout-ringed pools Where the otter whistles his mate, (They fear no men in the woods, Because they see so few.) You will hear the beat of a horse's feet, And the swish of a skirt in the dew, Steadily cantering through The misty solitudes, As though they perfectly knew The old lost road through the woods. But there is no road through the woods.

I suggest that anyone who hasn't should visit 'Bateman's', Kipling's home in East Sussex, if they are able. It is well worth a visit and is not just a pleasant house in a beautiful setting, but gives a lot of information about Rudyard Kipling's life and works.
